Re: Neighborhood Advisory Board's (NAB) response to the City of Greenville's 3 unrelated standard

The Neighborhood Advisory Board (NAB) voted unanimously to oppose changing the 3-unrelated rule at its June, 2012 meeting. Additionally, as part of its 2012-13 vision to create safer, more attractive neighborhoods with more cooperative relationships between neighbors and among neighborhoods, the NAB recognized the need to broadly consider the quality of life considerations raised by residents throughout this process - increased likelihood of trash, noise, crime that detract from neighborhood appearance and pride; maintenance of housing and yard conditions that suggest neighborhood decline; and ill will toward renters, landlords, and homeowners that threaten cooperative relationships - that an occupancy standard alone cannot address.

In addition to keeping the 3-unrelated standard unchanged, the NAB recommended that the City of Greenville undertake a broader discussion on how the city approaches the preservation and integrity of its established neighborhoods - of which occupancy is only a small, yet significant part. For this purpose, the NAB asked City Council to reconvene its Neighborhood Preservation and Housing Taskforce (from 2004) to analyze occupancy, along with innovative approaches to systematically address the potential negative effects of increased occupancy; endorse strategies to improve the long-term health of all neighborhoods; and finance mechanisms to achieve them. The NAB, with its diverse geographic and demographic representation and charge to preserve and strengthen neighborhoods in the City of Greenville, wanted to assist city staff and Council members by acting as the core group of this taskforce.

At its February 20, 2014 meeting, the Neighborhood Advisory Board again voted unanimously to support the 3-unrelated rule for the entire city. Quality of life issues were again discussed, and the board again stated the need to address problems that threaten neighborhood preservation for all parts of our city.

Subject: Street Light Locates and Repairs

Officers with the Greenville Police Department began an attempt to document all inoperable street lights during the month of February. Officers notify supervisors of inoperable lights, providing the location and utility number on the pole. This information is relayed to Greenville Utilities to identify the correct location and to arrange the needed repair. In return, Greenville Utilities notifies staff once the lights are repaired. Thus far, approximately 452 lights have been identified as inoperable; Greenville Utilities has acknowledged receipt of these notices and is in the process of repair.

Additionally, the Center City Unit is working closely with Public Works to implement new lighting in the Property Protection Initiative Area of East Greenville (picture below). This will change the current outdoor lighting to LED and make it a directional light versus an area light. This will help with light pollution as well as provide a cost savings.





Subject: Notes to Council – Invitation by the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP)

This memorandum is intended to provide information on an exclusive invitation I received from the ONDCP to participate in an advisory group comprised of a small group of police chiefs from across the country to discuss and recommend national policy as the White House shifts its priorities and strategies in the fight against illicit drugs and the social harms they inflict.

I have provided a short summary directly from the invitation-all costs are paid by the White House – OPM, ONDCP and the U.S. Department of Justice.

“You have been selected to attend the Law Enforcement Executive Roundtable on Police Practice Informed by the Science of Substance Use Disorders: Public and Police Safety funded by the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP). The Executive Roundtable will be held at the International Association of Chiefs of Police national headquarters on Tuesday, April 29th, 2014. We are excited to have the opportunity to assemble law enforcement executives like you from around the country who are recognized as innovative leaders in responding to society's most pressing criminal justice issues. During the Roundtable we will discuss ideas and strategies related to responding to individuals with substance use disorders who represent a large percentage of the population your Department encounters on a daily basis. Your insight, experience and expertise will be invaluable to the many conversations that will take place.”

There are obvious and subtle advantages to being involved in high level discussions that eventually will form national policy-the City of Greenville is considered one of several cities that are leading the way in policing reform efforts as well as being active participants in helping the federal government shape its approach and focus for the future.

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

Community Input and Safety – Sgt. Dale Mills, Greenville Police Department

Cpt. Ivey introduced Sgt. Mills as the new PCRC liaison. He stated that Sgt Mills will be working closely with the PCRC Chair on the upcoming meetings and topics. Cpt. Ivey stated that he felt like it was going to be an exciting time for PCRC because the police dept. has a lot of new initiatives and innovative things to fight and prevent crime.

Sgt. Mills introduced himself to the committee and citizens. Sgt. Mills stated he had been with the Greenville Police Dept. since 2001, before serving with the police dept. he served as a Sheriff Deputy in Pitt Co. Sgt. Mills has worked in all three bureaus at the police dept. He worked 5 years as a sexual assault investigator, and spent 5 years as a recruiting officer, now he is back in the Field Operations Bureau as a supervisor.

Sgt. Mills touched on some (Part1) crime prevention strategies.

- Communicate with neighbors (talk, share information)
- Citizens locking their vehicles (don't' leave value out to be seen)
- Vehicle Break-ins (computers, ipads, loose coins, camera, etc)
- Suspicious people in the neighborhood (riding bikes, don't live in the neighborhood)
- Community Watch
- Field Interview Cards (Completed by police officer when out on a call)

Cpt. Ivey asked the citizens if they had a twitter or face book account. He informed the citizens that the police dept. had a (PIO) Public Information Officer that sends out tips and safety information of things that take place in the city. He also gave out the Kristen Hunter email address (khunter@greenvillenc.gov) so that the citizens can make contact with her for general questions, or concerns.

Sgt. Mills asked the citizens if they had any questions regarding the police dept. and if they had any concerns in their neighborhood.
