NTC - "Action Park"

A recommendation of the Tar River Legacy Plan, and an associated Council priority, is to acquire riverside lake lands suitable for the development of a park/facilities that would foster a diverse array of recreational pursuits, many "river-related." Such pursuits would include kayaking, canoeing, paddle boarding, residential camping, hiking, fishing, BMX/skateboarding, zip lining, and environmental education.

It is anticipated that some recreational components of the park could be phased in over time in cooperation and partnership with various outside organizations, friends groups, and foundations. The first elements of the park would include a BMX/skatepark facility on an upland area of the property. Staff has been in contact with representatives of the Mirra family and local BMX leadership to coordinate planning and fundraising efforts related to the BMX/skatepark component.

Some land acquisition dollars have been identified within the Recreation and Parks capital budget, and staff recently met with a representative of a local land owner to explore possibilities. An appraisal of the prospective property is being arranged, and staff anticipates discussing future acquisition of the property with Council sometime in the first quarter of 2019.

The City has contracted with Stewart Engineering to complete a conceptual park master plan for the development of an "Action Park." The plan will be utilized in seeking outside support for the project. Future development will be contingent upon fundraising combined with identified City funding. In anticipation of applying for a North Carolina Parks and Recreation Trust Fund (PARTF) grant to support acquisition and/or development, initial meetings have been held with PARTF representatives about the 2019 grant cycle. The application deadline is May 1, 2019.

A public meeting to share concepts for the park and receive stakeholder input about possible project components is planned for <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>November 27</u>, at 6:00 p.m. in the third floor gallery at City Hall.

Staff expects to be able to share specific details of the proposed acquisition and plans for development with Council at the City Council Planning Session in January, 2019.

NTC – Private Development Initiative at Town Common

Priority 6 within City Council's Goals directs staff to "Continue to Implement Town Common Master Plan." Action Step 5 under Priority 6 directs staff to "Create and issue an RFP for a restaurant/event space to be developed in the 1.46 acre of Town Common that has no Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) development restrictions."

Staff has sought the assistance of The East Group in developing the referenced RFP that would solicit proposals to establish a public-private partnership for the development and operation of a restaurant/event space/watercraft rentals within the eastern-most area of the Town Common. Such an amenity, compatible with the existing park and of benefit to park visitors, was envisioned in the Town Common Master Plan.

Residential, hotel, office, and similar uses will not be considered.

Staff was recently updated on The East Group's progress toward developing concept plans for the project. Those plans will include the site plan for the proposed building, site and parking lot improvements, and a boat dock.

The East Group will complete the conceptual designs for the public-private partnership and the RFP in late December 2018. As part of the RFP development process, potentially interested developers, investors, and/or businesses will be invited to individual meetings with City and East Group staff to assist in refining the details of the RFP. Input from those meetings, which are tentatively scheduled for late November and early December, will be used to finalize the RFP.

Before it is released, the RFP will be presented at a City Council Workshop or at City Council's January Planning Session.

Police Community Relations Committee Meeting: Jarvis Memorial United Methodist Church – Oct. 9, 2018:




