4. Neighborhood Updates by board members/liaisons

Cambridge - Belinda Nolen

- No in-person neighborhood association meetings since the Coronavirus hit.
- A Teen Pizza Party was held on October 16, 2020. Teens from Single Tree and Concord neighborhoods also attended.
- On December 20, neighbors and teens Christmas caroled throughout the neighborhood
- The Neighborhood Association sent out a letter with holidays greetings to all residents.
- Joyce Williams, former NAB board member and Cambridge's liaison, gave a farewell treat bags to all neighbors. Joyce will be dearly missed by the Cambridge neighborhood.

College Court - Ann Hamze

- No in-person neighborhood association meetings since the coronavirus hit.
- A committee gave out a Holiday Greetings' flyer with a bell attached. Neighbors were asked to come out on their front porch on Christmas Eve at 6 pm and ring the bell.
- A number of homes have gone up for sale and sold quickly.
- A committee was formed to welcome the new homeowners and share the neighborhood website.

Tar River/University - Ann Maxwell

- No in-person neighborhood association meetings since the coronavirus hit.
- Zoom neighborhood board meetings continue and some association members and new residents have requested to be invited to these Zoom Meetings.
- Hap Maxwell, President of NA sent out an email to encourage all members to share TRUNA's website and obtain contact information on new residents.
- As ECU students have returned to campus, Captain Tyndale, Greenville Police Dept. and Captain Sutton, ECU Police Dept. continue to work together to ensure that students do not have gatherings of more than 50 and adhere to the 10 pm

curfew.

- TRUNA has become aware that some neighbors are afraid to report incidents to the police department due to fear of retribution and suffer in silence. Neighbors are encouraged to contact Kristen Below, Watch Captain, with any concerns.
- TRUNA lost their "walkable neighborhood" status after Harris Teeter Grocery Store and Rite Aid Pharmacy closed. The neighborhood association is encouraging its residents to shop at the new Globe Pharmacy (downtown) and hoping for a new grocery store to locate in their area. Their Council person, Will Bell, is making efforts to resolve the parking issues at the Globe Pharmacy.

Oakhurst - Susan Vickery-Mercer

• Last meeting was held before Halloween to make plans on how to safely give out candy to the "Trick or Treaters".

Lakewood Pines - Alise Rowan

- An outdoor neighborhood association meeting was held on October 20, 2020.
 It was catered by Great Harvest Bread and held outside while socially distancing.
- The neighborhood had their Christmas decorations up by November 1st this year and had many visitors enjoy their displays.
- Jonathan Bowling, sculptor, has placed several pieces of his art work at the Lakewood Pines Entrance Signs on Evans Street at the request of the association.
- A Landscape committee was formed to maintain the area around their Entrance Signs.

- Recycling John Demary, Director of Pitt County Solid Waste and Recycling, is hoping that a special bin for glass will be available in the future. John Coward, ECVC Operational Manager, is searching to find companies that will accept different types of recyclable materials, so ECVC can process them again.
- **Feral Cat Colonies** can be both a blessing and a curse. Feral cats will greatly decrease the song bird population. If the cats are in the TNR program (trap, neuter and release) they will reduce the snake, rat and mice problem in the area where they live without increasing the cat population.
