4th Annual Bike and Pedestrian Counts

- Two-Day Totals (from 2 locations: Evans & 5th; City Dog Park)
 - 2012: 50 bicyclists, 91 pedestrians,
 - 4 skateboarders/rollerbladers
 - 2013: 89 bicyclists, 1,168 pedestrians,

0 skateboarders/rollerbladers

- 2014: 85 bicyclists, 1,013 pedestrians,

13 skateboarders/rollerbladers

- 2015: 119 bicyclists, 1165 pedestrians,

20 skateboarders/rollerbladers



North-South Bike Connector

- Central Greenville has no north/south routes that are not high-speed arterials.
- NCDOT's Evans-Old Tar Road project will include bicycle infrastructure from Winterville to Greenville Boulevard
- We need a connection from Greenville Boulevard to Uptown Greenville. Working with Public Works Division on a plan.



Sidewalk Plan Review

- Commission members investigated the Public Works schedule of priorities for sidewalk upgrades.
- Review still under way.
- Will advise Public Works on urgent needs for sidewalk and crosswalk upgrades.

2015 Concerns

The Commission is concerned about:

•Green Mill Run Greenway, Phase II. Not currently funded to reach Evans Park and J.H. Rose High School, as originally planned.

•South Tar River Greenway, Phase III. Not currently funded to reach Vidant Hospital and medical district, as originally planned.



Programming Sessions





Comments

This was the most desired program element because: (1) it is low maintenance, and a great way to preserve open space, and (2) It would be a low maintenance element and appeal to a wide range of users.







General Comments


- 1). Safety (for areas residents) will be an issue with more users coming to the proposed park.
- 2). Lack of parking is a major issue. Added amenities will only make it worse.
- 3). There is a perceived danger in disk golf and other users i.e. walkers/joggers, gardeners, dog park users etc. There needs to be a distinct separation / a buffer between disk golf and trail users.
- 4). The dog park should be expanded and additional amenities added.



General Comments

- 5). "Expand and exploit" river access. Consider thinning out underbrush and open views to the river.
- 6). A playground area is desirable, but should be located away from the river's edge and close to restrooms.
- 7). Large open area should be kept natural with little development for multiple uses.





Comments

The consensus from the attendees was that this program element is a great idea. Many felt that this would be a wonderful way to connect park users to the river. Combined with an overlook, a kayak landing would be a cost efficient way to provide access to the river.

The majority of the attendees thought that this element would be a great addition to the proposed park. The overlook would be a great way to provide passive access to the river.






Comments

Comments

The attendees were unanimous in their support for a public restroom. This facility would serve many users including the South Tar River Greenway, and the off leash dog park, as well as users of future park elements. As the park grows and amenities are added, a restroom facility will be essential.







Comments

The attendees highly desired open space as a low maintenance, and informal park element. Many argues that the disk golf course could be used double as open space when not in use. It was suggested that time limits be put on the use of the disk golf course so that the area could be used as open space.







Comments

Because the proposed park is in a neighborhood that primarily caters to college students, many attendees were against a playground as a park element. However, the Tar River Legacy Master Plan recommended a playground in this area, a request that was strongly supported by attendees of the public input sessions for that project.

SCHEMATIC MASTER PLAN DESCRIPTION

The Tar River Park Master Plan was developed as means for developing the project site into a neighborhood park that will provide access to the Tar River, protect and preserve open space, expand recreation facilities and opportunities, and improve the quality of life through leisure activities.

The Tar River Park Master Plan includes the following proposed activities that are further described in this section

I). SAND VOLLEYBALL COURT



Although it was not one of the highest ranking park elements, a sand volleyball court with nets and lines is proposed for the park. The park element is a low cost and low maintenance activity that has proven to be a popular amenity in other parks.

2). RIVER OVERLOOK



A river overlook was proposed as a preferred activity in the Tar River Legacy Plan. The public input sessions participants favored this park element as a means to gain access to the river for both passive and active recreational uses.



3). THREE HOLES - DISC GOLF



A three-hole disc golf course is proposed to provide users with an informal way to enjoy the sport as a recreational activity in the park. This course is ideal for avid users that want a convenient way to play a few holes or for those that are new to the sport and want to get familiar with disc golf before moving to a full course.

4). PICNIC SHELTERS



Two picnic shelters are proposed in the Tar River Park Master Plan. One 35' x 45' shelter will be located on an existing concrete pad in the existing F.R.O.G.G.S garden, and one 25'x 35' shelter adjacent to the playground area. The shelters will be equipped with site furnishings and amenities including grills and picnic tables.

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5). KAYAK LANDING



A kayak landing will provide additional access to the Tar River. Kayakers can use the landing to dock their kayaks to rest along their journey or it can be used as a kayak put-in.

6). ADVENTURE PLAYGROUND



A playground will be provided at Tar River Park. The proposed playground will be located near the smaller picnic shelter. The playground will include areas for the 2-5 and 5 – 12 age groups.



7). RESTROOM FACILITY



With the proposed amenities and the inevitable popularity of the proposed park, restroom facilities will be essential. A small restroom facility with attached water fountains is planned for the park.

8). OFF-LEASH DOG PARK EXPANSION



The City's only off leash dog park is adjacent to undeveloped parkland. To address the growing popularity of this facility, an expansion to the existing off leash dog park is proposed on the one acre tract south of the existing dog park.







Green Infrastructure

- Letter of Intent to Fund February 2014
- ER/EID approved August 2014 (\$10M)
- 10 BMPs were proposed
- Open channel between 3rd and 4th Streets






Redirection by Dept of Water Infrastructure

- Regional BMP needed



ER/EID Amendment


- 10 BMPs were reduced to 6 BMPs
- Regional RSC included (250' Long x 40' Wide)
- Nitrogen removal increased from 69 lb/yr to 252 lb/yr

Results of Amendment

- Equitable distribution of BMPs
 - Total Pollutant removal (~252 lb N/yr)
- Treat both surface runoff and flow through the trunk line (10th St. Connector).
- Large-scale Regenerative Stormwater Conveyance (RSC) System
 - Removes large amounts of pollutant (~191 lb N/yr)
 - On-line structure treating 258 acres.





Project BMPs will convert about 10% of Town Creek Watershed (8-10 city blocks) to Coastal Plain Forest (from a treatment perspective)
