## **Enabling Authority**

## Item 9: Authorization and funding of the "Greenville Youth@Work" summer program



Purpose:

•In support of Council's Strategic Plan initiatives to provide employment and training opportunities to the extent possible

•City is proposing to extend its partnership with Region Q Youth@Work program to provide summer employment and life skills training to eligible youth who are both in and out-of-school, to assist them in their career and educational development



- Partnership with Region Q Youth@Work Program (Region Q program is authorized and funded under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act – WIOA)
- Provides employment, training, and educational activities to eligible low-income youth, ages 16-24, who face barriers to employment



- Provide employment opportunities to 25 eligible youth
   20 youth to be funded by the City of Greenville
  - 5 youth to be funded by Region Q Youth@Work
- Region Q Youth@Work staff will screen applications and refer eligible youth to City's HR Department
- 20 youth funded by City must meet same eligibility requirements and reside within city limits



- Pay rate will be \$7.25 per hour
- Youth will work up to 25 hours per week for 7 weeks in various City departments
- Potential to earn up to \$1,269
- Youth will work as office staff, light laborers, and staff assistants



- Youth will attend life skills workshops provided by Pitt Community College's Continuing Education and Community Development Department
- Workshop topics will include resume development, mock interviews, dress for success, computer skills, communication skills, etc.
- Will incorporate the Career Readiness Certificate (CRC) component at no expense to City or youth



- Program will be advertised via:
  - NCWorks
  - City of Greenville website
  - Pitt County Schools
  - Pitt Community College
  - Boys and Girls Clubs
  - Department of Social Services
  - Flyers to be distributed to churches, community centers (e.g., Lucille W. Gorham Intergenerational Center), etc.
  - Word of mouth (current participants, staff, etc.)

Supplemental municipal agreement with the North Carolina Department of Transportation for design and construction of the South Tar River Greenway Phase 3 – Pitt Street to Moye Blvd



What is being requested?

 Approval of the Supplemental Municipal Agreement with NCDOT, which reduces the construction limits of the project and extends the completion time to December 30, 2017

What are the new limits?


 West of Pitt Street to east of Memorial Drive at Nash Street



### South Tar River Greenway Phase 3A & 3B









Highlights of Phase 3A location:

- Connects to existing trail north of 1st Street Place
   Apartments
- Traverses under existing bridge abutment where CSXT railroad crosses Tar River
- Descends along Tar River north of Contentnea, Vance, and White Streets
- Ascends back to street level north of Ford St.
- Turns street-side at Hudson St., and runs along Colonial Street to end at Nash St.

Why is reduction in limits necessary now?

Addition of design elements since 60% plans, that limit environmental impacts



Design changes resulting in cost increases

<u>Geotechnical report</u> – Additional design requirements

Poor soil conditions

- •Reinforced concrete slab supported by steel piles
- •Longer retaining walls for slope stability

•Increase of \$640,000



Design changes resulting in cost increases

Land Quality and DWQ Required Changes

- Erosion Control measures during construction
- Conveyances of stormwater and natural overland flow
  - Additional stormwater piping
  - Two additional boardwalks
- Increase of \$190,000



Design changes resulting in cost increases

Added Safety Considerations:

Conduit for lights, cameras and/or blue light phones
Pedestrian Post and Cable Fence – fall protection
Chain Link Fence – restrict access to Moyewood
Retention Pond
Bollards – restrict motorized vehicular access

Increase of \$252,000



Other changes resulting in cost increases

Increases of quantities or updates of pricing due to recent bids:

- Asphalt
- Aggregate Base Course
- Signing
- Prefabricated Steel Pedestrian Bridge
- Increase of \$166,000



Schedule for Phase 3A


- •May 30, 2016 Submit final plans, specifications and environmental document to NCDOT for review

- •December 2017 Complete Construction






### **Intersection Selection Process**



- Traffic Engineering Accident

# Charles Blvd. & Firetower Rd.

- NC 43 S. (Charles Blvd.) **45 MPH**
- Firetower Rd 45 MPH
- 133 Collisions (2009-2013)
- 36% Rear end, Slow or Stop
- 26% Left turn, same roadway
- 16% Angle
- 22% Other



# Greenville Blvd. & East Arlington Blvd.

- US-264 Alt (Greenville Blvd) **45 MPH**
- E. Arlington Blvd 45 MPH
- 122 Collisions (2009-2013)
- 41% Rear end, slow or stop
- 25% Angle
- 11% Left turn, same roadway
- 23% Other



# Memorial Dr. & West Arlington Blvd.

- NC-11S (Memorial Drive) 45 MPH
- W. Arlington Blvd 35 MPH
- 90 Collisions (2009-2013)
- 47% Rear end, Slow or stop
- 14% Left turn, same roadway
- 14% Angle
- 24% Other



# S. Charles Blvd & E. 14<sup>th</sup> Street

- S. Charles Blvd 35MPH
- E 14<sup>th</sup> Street 35MPH
- 77 Collisions (2009-2013)
- 26% Left turn, same roadway
- 26% Angle
- 23% Rear end, slow or stop
- 25% Other



## Firetower Road & Arlington Blvd

- Firetower Road 45 MPH
- Arlington Blvd 45 MPH
- 130 Collisions (2009-2013)
- 37% Rear end, slow or stop
- 22% Left turn, same roadway
- 12% Angle
- 29% Other




# How It Works

- Selected intersections are equipped with Automated Red Light Camera equipment which includes a still camera and digital video camera installed near the roadway
- The system is triggered when a vehicle enters an intersection after the light cycles to red
- The vendor checks the violation for validity (i.e. no funeral or police guidance)
- The Greenville Police Department will make final determination if a civil citation is warranted
- The vehicle's registered owner is mailed the civil citation, which includes two still photos of the violation, one photo of the displayed license plate, and instructions of how to view a video clip




## Fayetteville, NC

- 5 the number of intersections equipped with Red Light Safety Camera Systems
- 10 the number of cameras installed (2 at each of the 5 intersections)
- 43 average number of red light violations per day
- 46% reduction in red light violations at the five intersections equipped with the Red Light Safety Camera Systems within the first 6 months (July – December)
- 7,657 approximate number of red light violations caught on camera from July 8, 2015 - December 31, 2015

# **Cost Analysis**

- •\$4,500 price to lease each camera per month
- •\$52,200 net revenue for the month of December (Fayetteville, NC)
- •\$Millions estimated cost to each community for a single traffic fatality according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration
- •\$0 cost/risk to tax payer this program is set up to be fully funded through fines paid by red light violators
