Subject:

Student and Market-Rate Apartment Housing Analysis

During City Council's June 5, 2017 meeting, Council received a draft Request for Proposal (RFP) to seek a qualified and experienced real estate research consultant to prepare a student and market rate apartment and housing analysis to determine whether the supply of private dormitory developments, existing and approved for construction, have saturated or will saturate the housing market. City Council authorized issuance of the RFP with a maximum consulting fee of \$20,000.

On July 14, 2017, the Community Development, Planning Division and the Financial Services, Purchasing Division issued a Request for Proposal 17-18-02 for consultant services for the analysis. The City received three proposals by the August 11, 2017 submittal deadline. The consultant selection committee evaluated proposals and selected the firm of Kimley-Horn.

The contract is currently circulating for execution. The schedule has been prepared to start the project this month with the goal of presenting the final document in December.

NEW BUSINESS:

Guest Speaker: Lt. Carlton Williams – Greenville Police Department Topic: Security System Problems

Lt. Carlton Williams informed the citizens about the current security company sales associates that are out in various neighborhoods. No company name was mentioned but he wanted residents to be smart about opening doors to unknown people. Most of the sales had occurred later in the afternoon and as late as 9:30 to 10:00 p.m. He received an email from a citizen who received a solicitation at 9:30 p.m. and the security alarm system sales person showed up at 10:00 p.m. to complete the installation. Lt. Williams reminded the citizens it is there door and they do not have to open it. Lt. Williams stated that he recommends before any citizen have someone coming to their home. 1. Know who they are and check out their services ahead of time. Lt. Williams also stated that if the salesperson say: "if it is such a good deal today; then it probably should be a great deal tomorrow." If it sounds too good to be true, the old saying: "it probably is." Take your time and decide services you as a citizen want in your home and also decide who you let into your home. Please make sure that the person is properly permitted. The Greenville Police Department issues permits with the person's picture on the permit. It is a separate ID from their other ID's. Lastly he informed the citizens to use caution and if they had any idea that the person may be suspicious in nature or if they felt uncomfortable do not open the door. And as always Lt. Williams informed the citizens to call the police department if they felt they needed to. He reminded the citizens that the police officers are on duty to serve all citizens.

Guest Speaker: Lt. Michael Broadwell – Greenville Police Department Topic: Red Light Camera Initiative


Lt. Broadwell introduced himself to the Police Committee Relations Committee and citizens shared some of his work history with the Greenville Police Department. Below are some key points Lt. Broadwell discussed regarding the "Red Light Initiative Program."

- Greenville will start using red light cameras in approximately 45 days.
- The red light camera program is scheduled to go into service at the end of July or the beginning of August.
- There will be a 30-day grace period in which drivers caught on camera running a
 red light will receive warning tickets and they'll be able to go online and watch a
 video that shows their vehicle running the red light.
- The city is contracting with American Traffic Solutions to implement 10 red light cameras at five intersections, which include Memorial Drive and Arlington Boulevard, Greenville Boulevard and Arlington Boulevard, Arlington Boulevard and Fire Tower Road, Charles Boulevard and 14th Street and Charles Boulevard and Fire Tower Road.
- The cost of the program is \$2.5 million, with each camera costing approximately \$200,000. The cost of the program is expected to be paid for by the fines from the citations people receive for running the red lights.
- Each fine is \$100, with a \$100 late fee if it's not paid on time.
- Based on figures from Fayetteville, which also has a red light camera program
 run by American Traffic Solutions, it is expected that about 43 citations will be
 issued each day and that \$1.3 million will go to Pitt County Schools.
- Fayetteville experienced a 46-percent reduction in crashes at their red light camera intersections.
- Citations are mailed to the registered owner of the car. Even if the owner was not the driver who ran the red light, the owner will be responsible for paying the civil fine. No points will be added to an owner's driving record, and in some cases, the owner can fill out a form to transfer liability to the driver of the vehicle.
- The citation is like getting a parking ticket. The owner of the vehicle is responsible for paying it.
- The system works by anticipating, based on speed, when someone is going to run a red light. That alerts the camera, which takes a photo as the car approaches the stop line or stop bar then takes another photo of the car in the intersection.
- If the front of the vehicle has not crossed the stop line when the light turns
 red, American Traffic Solutions sends that video to the Greenville Police
 Department, where a Greenville officer will review the video to determine whether
 to issue the ticket.
- After a person gets the ticket, he or she can go online, use the code on the ticket and watch the video of their vehicle running the red light. If the owner doesn't think the video shows the vehicle running the red light, the person can appeal the ticket.
