<u>Title of Item:</u> Uptown Commercial Solid Waste Collection – Current Approach & Alternatives

**Explanation:** Commercial Solid Waste in the Uptown District is currently collected by as many as seven different vendors. The vendors are contracted to perform the work through the individual business and/or property owners within the Uptown District. City personnel and equipment do not collect commercial solid waste. By ordinance, City personnel only collect residential solid waste within the city limits.

Over the last several years, there have been challenges reported to City staff with the collection of commercial solid waste in Uptown as well as the condition of the dumpster locations relating to cleanliness and aesthetics. Commercial collection sites in Uptown vary from the back of buildings, to adjacent sidewalks, to private parking lots and public parking lots. The public parking lots have been the primary source of the collection and aesthetic challenges throughout the District.

The City hired Raftelis to assist with the evaluation of the current commercial collection system and to provide recommendations on alternatives to better address commercial solid waste collection in the Uptown District. The main focus of the analysis has been to evaluate the refuse collection service delivery with concerns to:

- Consistency in service levels
- Transparency of cost/fee structure
- Elimination of litter and eyesores related to dumpsters in public areas

City staff and Raftelis have met with a large number of Uptown Greenville business owners and conducted a public meeting for the purpose of better understanding current service levels and stakeholder interest in alternative delivery models.

The City and Raftelis have analyzed the existing collection system and compared the current system to other benchmark/university cities in an effort to develop collection alternatives that are consistent with current best practices. The City and Raftelis will present these findings as well as the recommended alternatives to Council at the workshop. Staff will use feedback received from Council to implement next steps moving forward. 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<u>Title of Item:</u>	Establish stakeholders group for proposed revisions to the City's Manual of Standard Designs and Details (MSDD)
Explanation:	The MSDD was created in 1980 and last revised in 2011. It serves as the standards for building infrastructure in the City of Greenville. The current Manual is posted on the City's website at the link below. https://greenvillenc.gov/government/engineering/manual-of-standard-designs-and-details
	The Manual is maintained by the City Engineer and as such, the Engineering Department has been working diligently over the last several months to begin the process of revising the MSDD. Staff has created a list of proposed revisions based on prior input from the engineering and development community, as well as lessons learned by City staff since the last revision. Staff proposes to engage a stakeholder's group consisting of local developers, contractors, and engineers to discuss the proposed revisions prior to finalizing the revisions and adopting the revised standards. We would also like to provide the engineering and development community an opportunity to offer suggestions for further revisions that may not currently be under consideration by the City.
Fiscal Note:	No notable fiscal impact to City operating budgets.
Recommendation:	Staff requests that City Council review the proposed stakeholders group and recommend additional members if so desired, as well as appoint a liaison from the City Council if desired.
