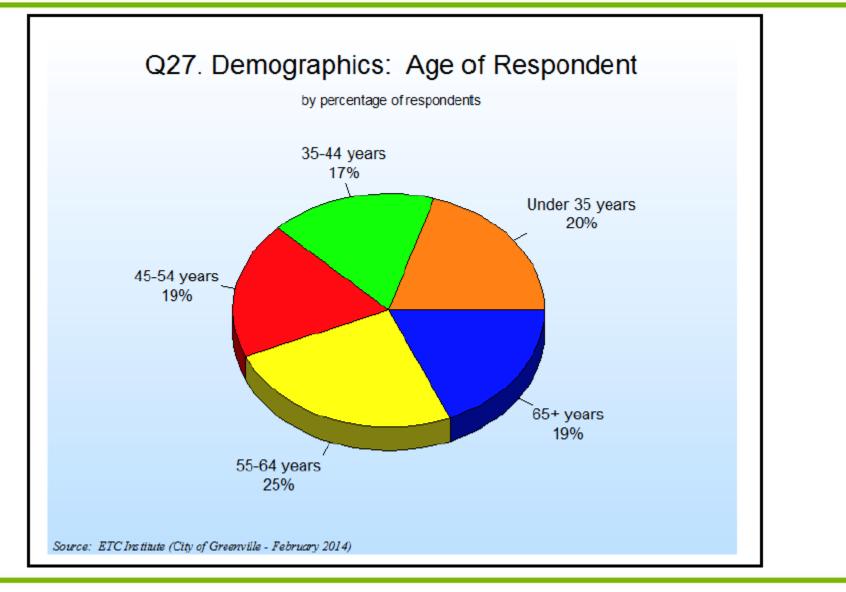




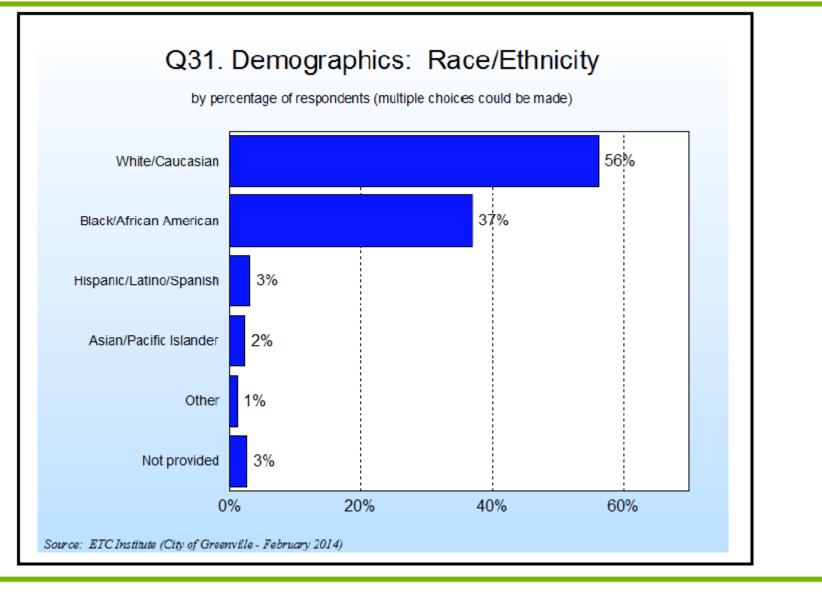
Purpose

- Help with planning, budgeting, and administration



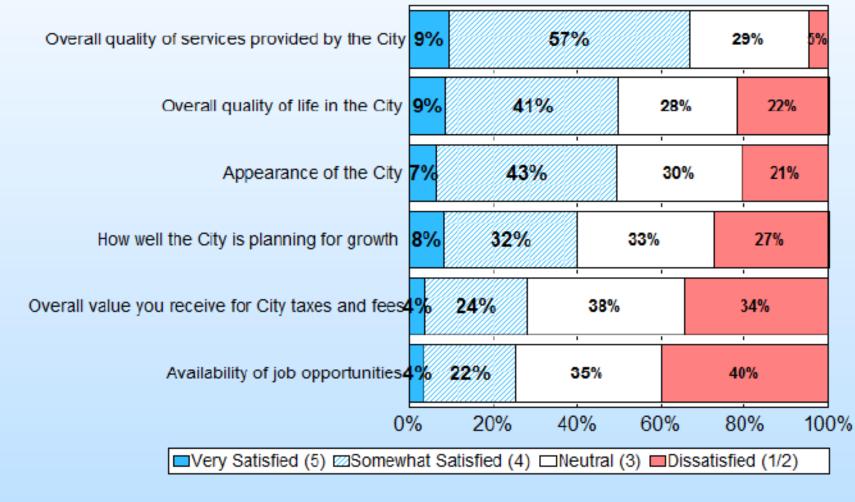






Q3. Satisfaction with Various Items That May Influence Respondents' Perception of the City of Greenville

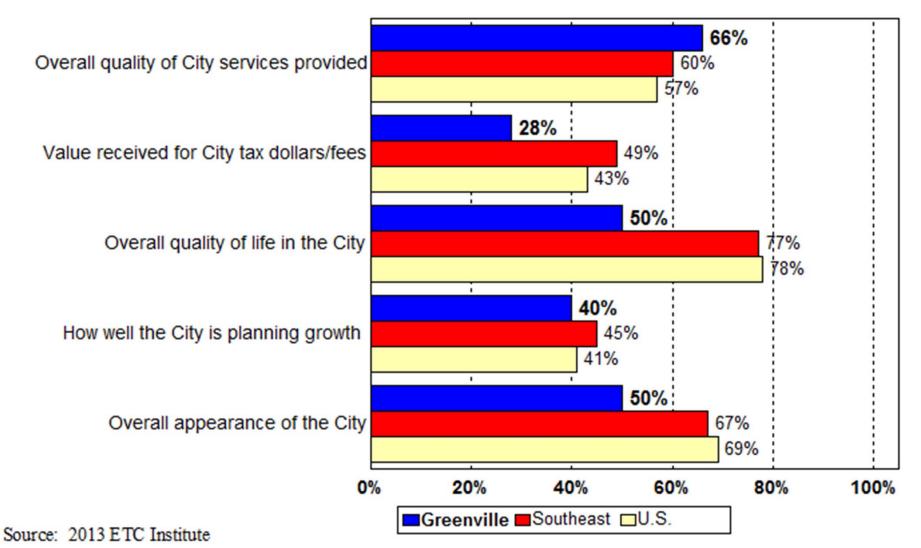
by percentage of respondents who rated the item as a 1 to 5 on a 5-point scale (excluding don't knows)

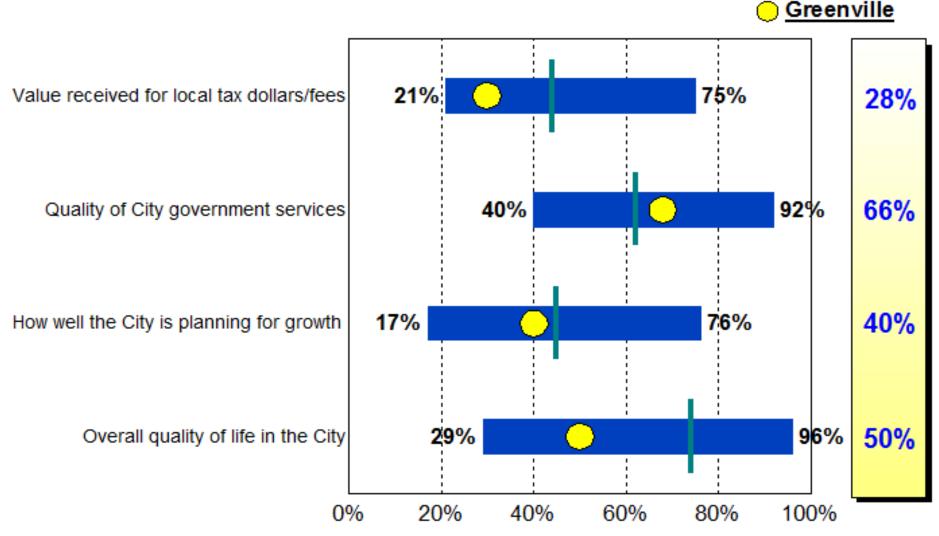
Satisfaction with Issues that Influence Perceptions of the City Greenville vs. Southeast vs. the U.S

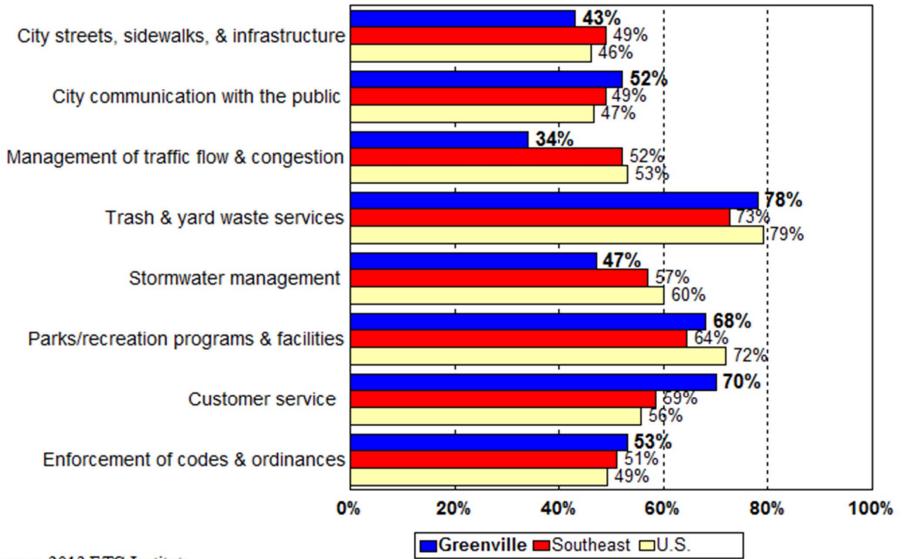

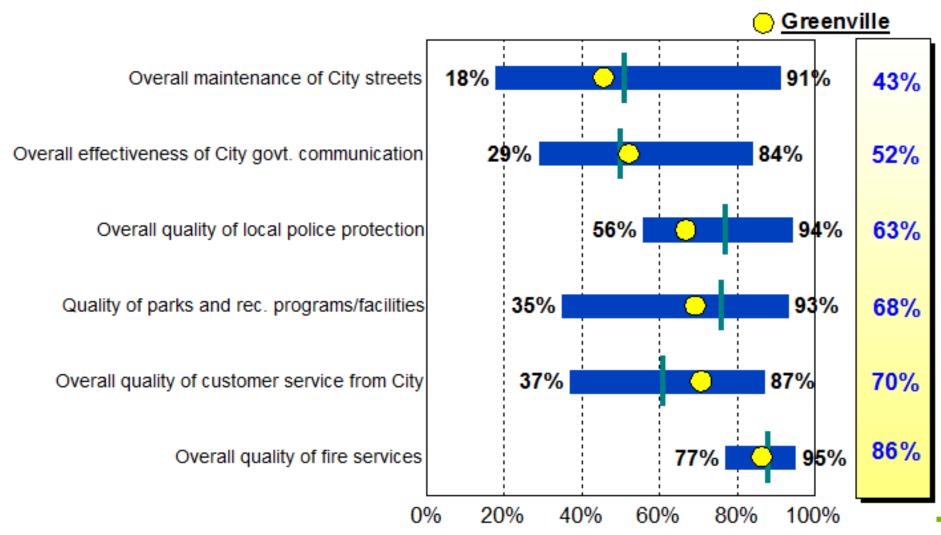

Overall Satisfaction with Various City Services 2013

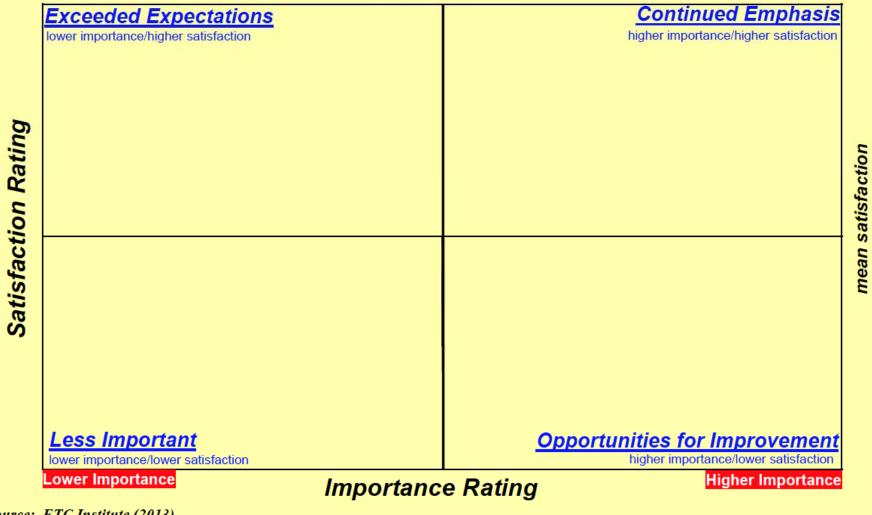

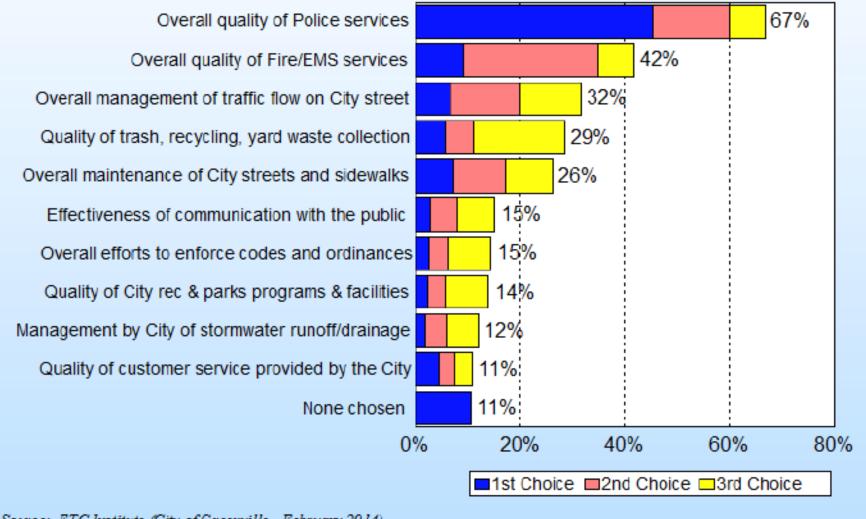

Q2. City Services That Are Most Important for the City to Provide

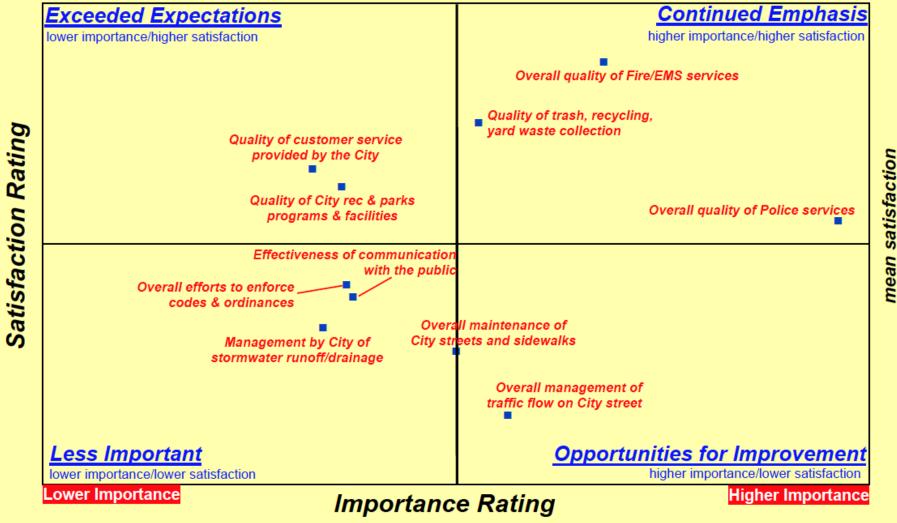

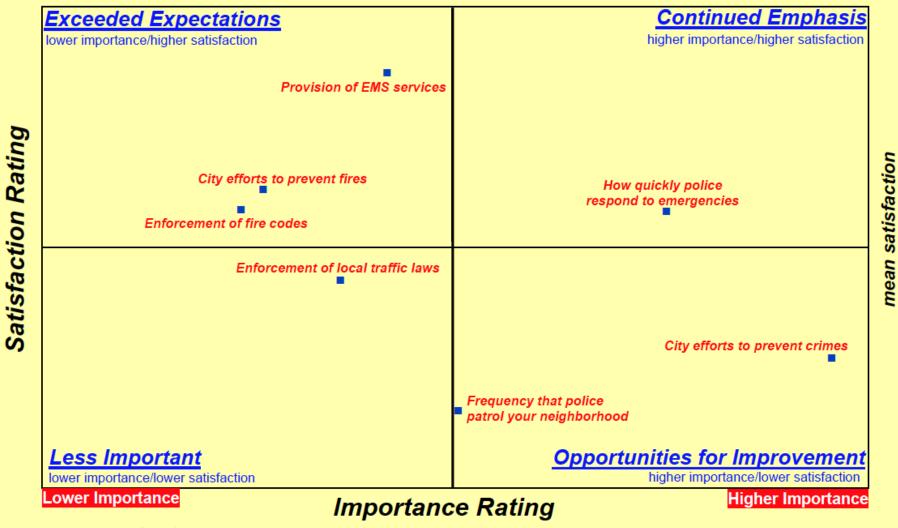

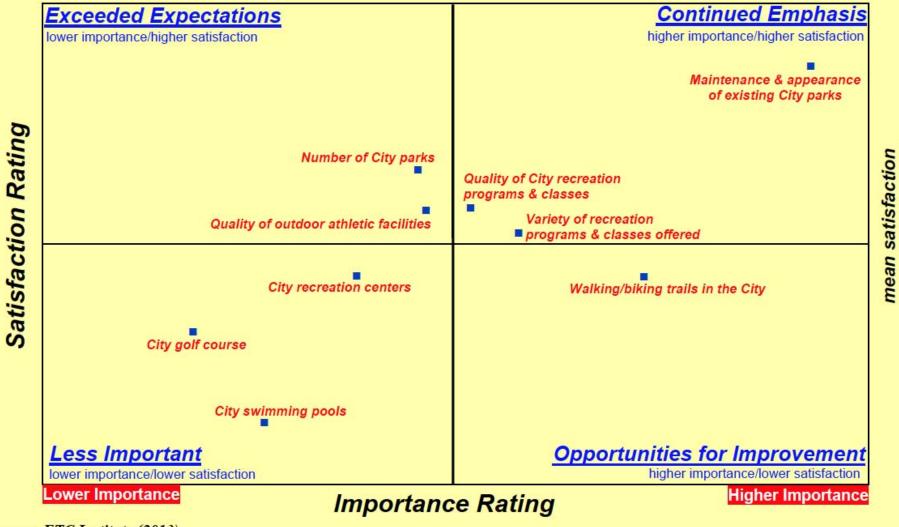

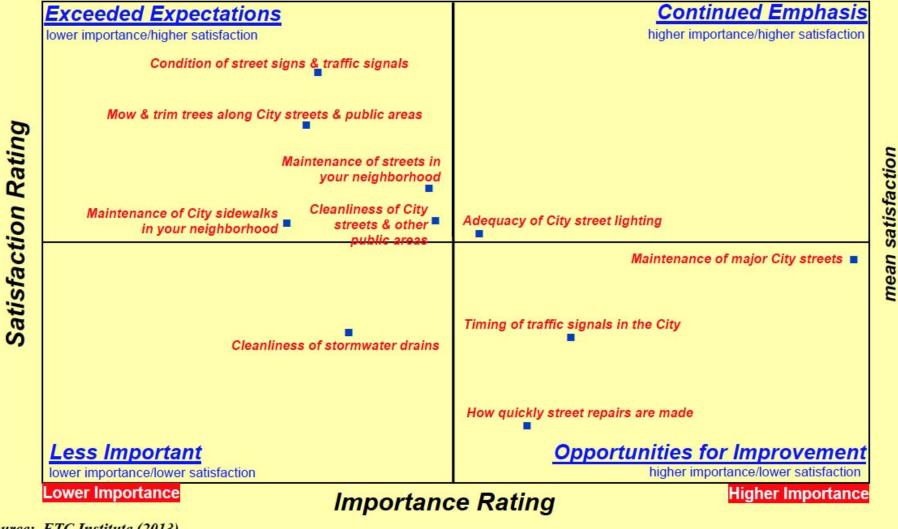

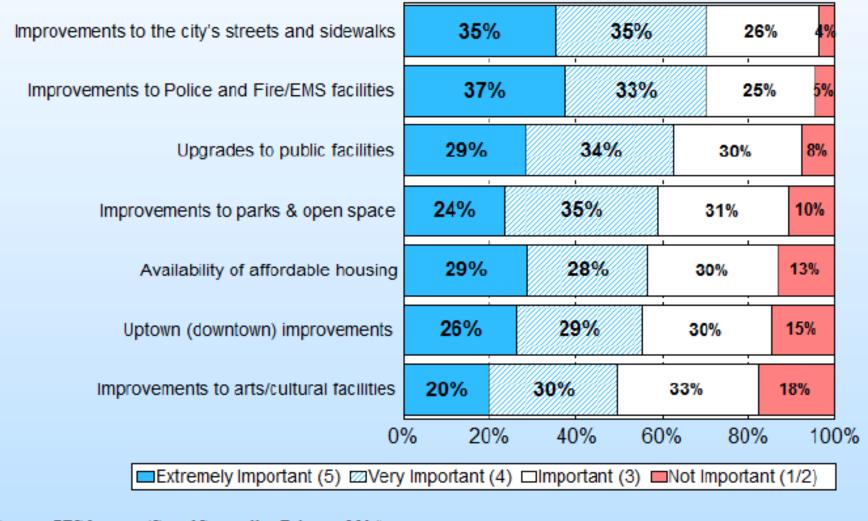

Q20. Importance of the City Continuing to Invest in Various Projects

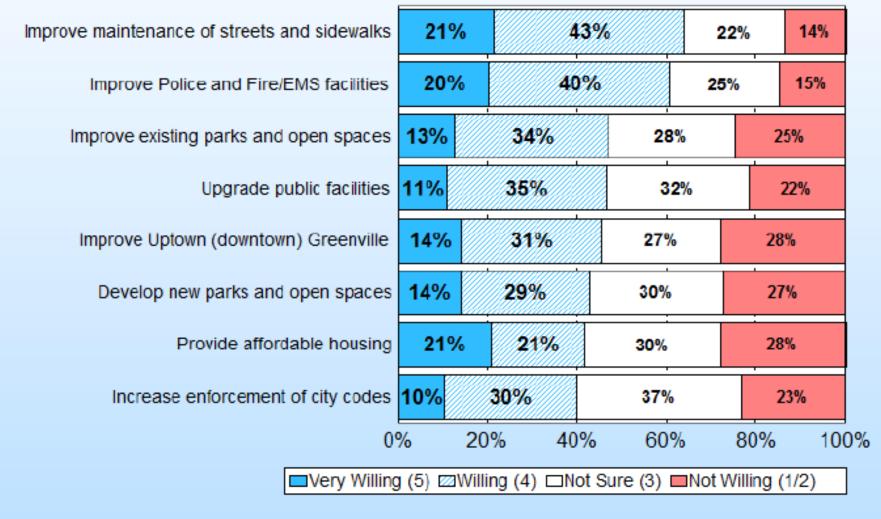

What is a **Capital Improvement Program? Decision Making Tool** ✓ Prioritize capital needs ✓ Guide capital investments ✓Maximize limited resources

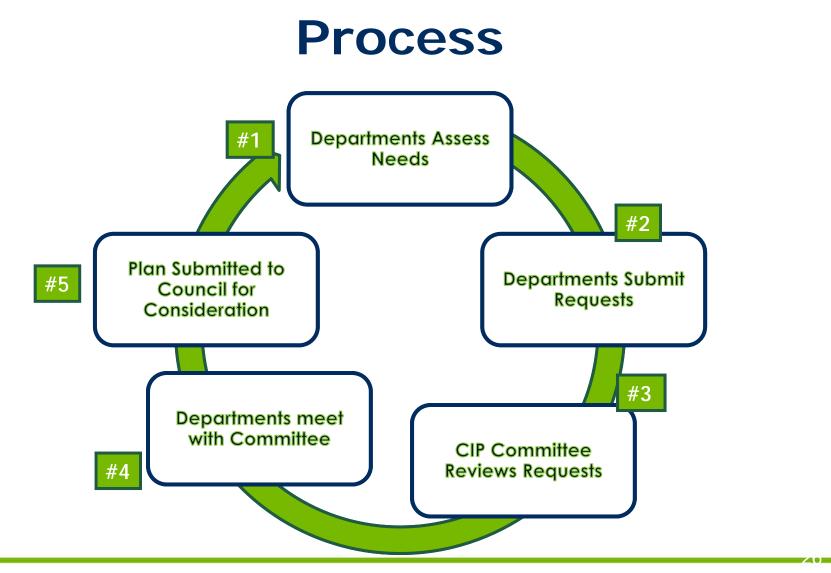


What is a Capital Improvement?

Equipment greater than \$35,000 and has a useful life of at least 5 years.

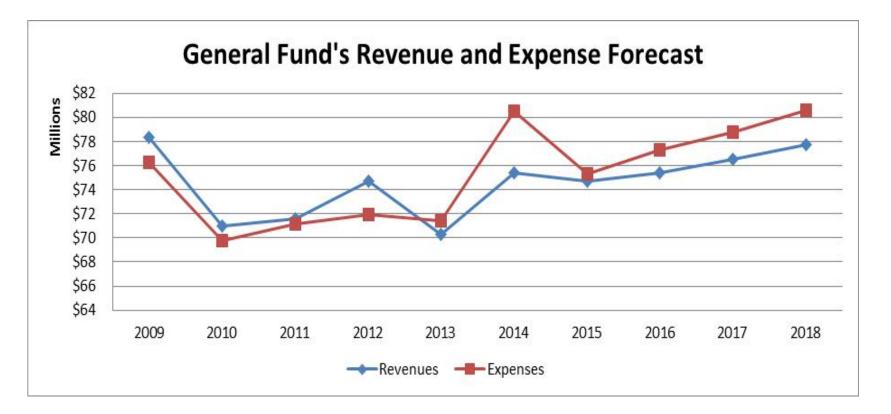
All projects that cost more than \$10,000 and have a useful life of at least 10 years





Find yourself in good company





 Financial Projections depict growing annual deficits over the next five-years



What Does This Mean?

Revenues not growing at a rate to address all needs:

- Vehicles and Equipment Vehicle Replacement Fund
- Transportation
 - Street paving, sidewalks, traffic lights, ped. crossings, etc.
- Maintenance of Existing Facilities Facilities Improvements Plan
- New Capital/Projects

New parks and facilities and various other departmental needs

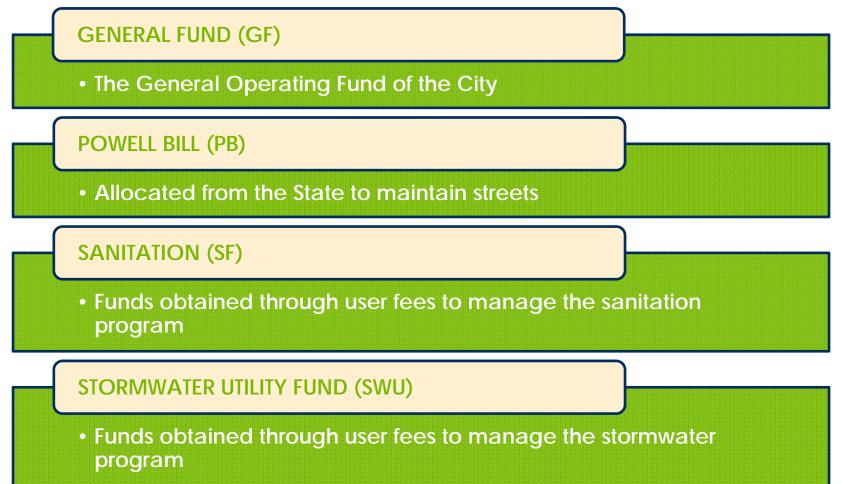

\$50 for first \$25,000

Up to the first \$3.925m in

Gross Receipts

Capped at \$2,000

Definition	Levied on a specific good
	or service

Mandate Adopt an ordinance levying the tax

Effective May 8, 1980, the City Date adopted ordinance 963

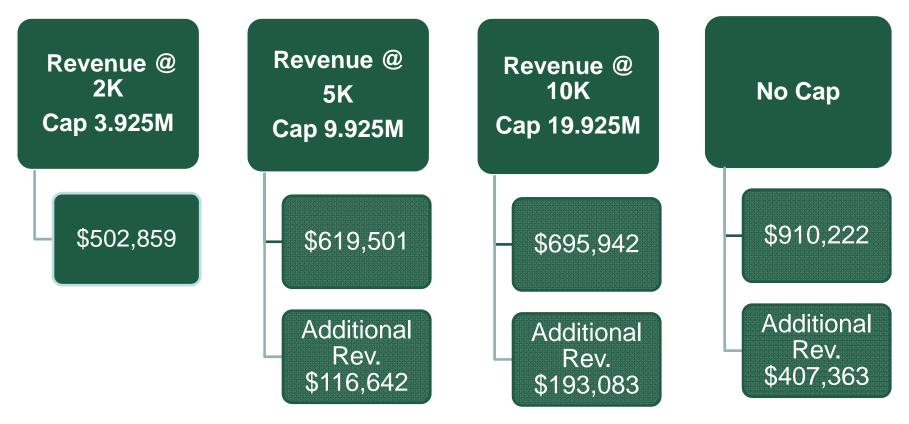

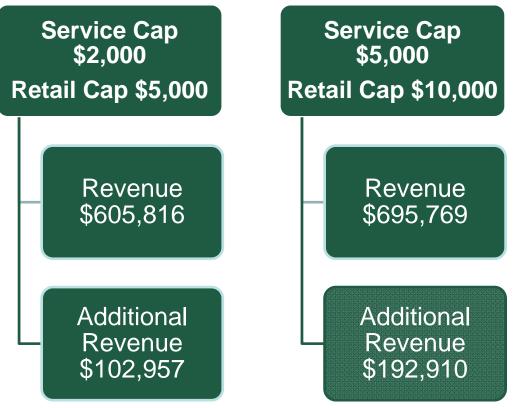

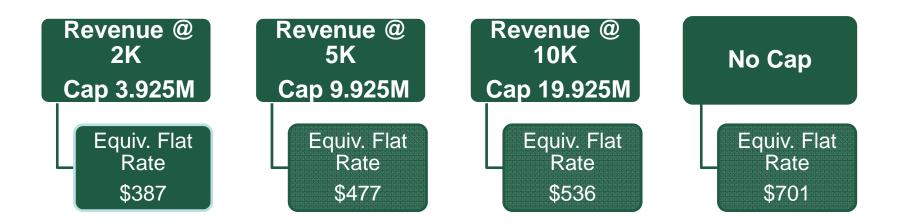
